Letter from the Co-Pastors

"Father, if you are willing, remove this cup from me; yet, not my will but yours be done."
—Luke 22:42

In the Garden of Gethsemane, Jesus utters this remarkable prayer—remarkable because we see that Jesus is no divine robot, but that he has a choice: a choice to pursue his will or God's will. What a temptation it must have been to turn away from Jerusalem and the fate that awaited him there. Couldn't he save more people if he saved himself? Or, as others contended, wouldn't he do more good if he led an army of rebel to rise up and throw out the Roman oppressors? Palm Sunday revealed that at least a portion of the population would be willing to join in such an insurrection behind Jesus.

"Yet, not my will but yours be done." Perhaps better than any other statement in the gospel, this simple prayer describes what Jesus is about—not only during this week in Jerusalem but throughout his life and ministry. He follows the path that God wants him to travel. He may be attempted to turn aside, but he is unwavering in his obedience and faithfulness, his courage and love. And through his obedience, the rebellion and disobedience of Adam and Eve in another garden long ago, and the rebellion and disobedience of each mortal since Adam and Eve, is covered with grace and love.

"Yet, not my will but yours be done." In a sentence, this is what it means to be a Christian, to follow Christ: we seek to do, not our will, but God's will, just as Jesus did. But how do we know God's will? That is the question, isn't it? And there are no easy answers—but there are answers when we pray as Jesus prayed and meditate on the Scriptures as he did. And there are answers when we listen to, and lean on, the collective wisdom of the body of Christ. But ultimately, the best way to discern and then do God's will is to follow Jesus as he journeys towards God.

"Yet, not my will but yours be done." Doing God's will is not easy. Sometimes we will feel like we are in the dark, sometimes we will even feel like we are abandoned by God and others in our own gardens of Gethsemane. And sometimes, it may even appear that doing God's will is as futile and foolish as...the cross. But as Easter reveals, the power, the wisdom, and the love of God confound anything that we might even imagine.

We hope you will join us during all of Holy Week. Together, may we seek to follow in Jesus' footsteps, not only on the mountaintops of Palm Sunday and Easter, but also through the valley of Maundy Thursday and Good Friday. And, in so doing, may we learn more about what it means to pray: *"Yet, not my will but yours be done."*
